#### **North Curry Nights**

Two nights of jazz, folk, brass and funk for the start of summer at North Curry Village hall. Doors open 7:30pm music 8:00 to 10:30. Cost £7; £5 concession; £14 family ticket. Refreshments available, BYO alcohol.

#### 10th June - The Little Big Horns

New Orleans comes to North Curry with this funky five-piece band playing modern New Orleans street music, reggae and traditional jazz. Up front and danceable, the band runs on the pumping rhythm section of drummer Mike Hurley and tuba player Tom Francombe. Trumpet player Joe Porter is another fine young local musician while the band is completed by the older but no wiser heads of Brian Pearson on trombone and sax player Tim Hill. Band leader Tim specialises in outdoor music, his street band Tongues of Fire play festivals and events all over the country and he creates music for outdoor theatre shows. Special guest for the night is one of the best jazz trombonists in the country Robert Jarvis.

Plus funk and reggae 'sound system'

#### 8th July - The Albion Horns

Rich, rhythmic and evocative folk music played on reeds and brass. Playing arrangements of traditional material like folk songs and ballads, work songs, funeral hymns and dances, the Albion Horns recreates the idea of the village band for the 21st century, mixing influences from jazz, classical and brass music. They will feature many Somerset tunes tonight and perhaps the ghosts of the old North Curry band will join in.

The band features the wonderful trumpet player Stuart Henderson. From 1983- 2005 Stuart was the lead trumpet player of Her Majesty's Household Division and he has played the Edinburgh, Glasgow, Brecon jazz festivals and venues such as Ronnie Scott's and the Jazz Café in London. Tuba player Tom Francombe was in the National Youth Orchestra. Trombone player Phil Humphries plays early brass, including the serpent, once heard in country churches all over the south of England, and has performed and recorded internationally, including at the BBC Proms and with the New London Consort and the Gabrieli Consort & Players.

## Bells in June – and St. Peter & St. Paul

When you hear the bells being rung on a Sunday, or for a wedding, it's the local North Curry team at work of course. Sometimes however there's ringing on other occasions, and this is often a visiting team from another part of the country doing a tour of churches in the area. They are usually quite accomplished ringers.

So when sometimes the local team has been ringing, and someone asks "Was that a visiting team yesterday?" – this is taken as quite a compliment!

Ringing by such visiting teams happens fairly frequently, and is not normally announced in advance. Next month however there will be something different from usual, in that whereas normally the visitors ring for under an hour, in this case our visitors, a team from North Somerset, will be attempting a "full peal", which necessitates about three hours of ringing.

A peal such as this involves over 5,000 changes: in other words 5,000 non-stop sequences of 8 with the order of bells changing at every stroke, without any repetition. It's a nice challenge for a mathematician, let alone a ringer...

There are a vast number of different peal "methods" or "compositions": at this stage we don't know which particular one will be performed. But we can rest assured that the standard of ringing will be good. It's scheduled for Thursday 29<sup>th</sup> June, the feast of St. Peter and St. Paul, North Curry's "patronal day", from 10:00am. So listen out then if this is of interest.
